The 2004 Bentley Continental GT Coupe is silver with tan and black leather and dark burr wood grain interior. It is a six speed automatic with manual shift facility and continuous all wheel drive. The Coupe has tinted windows, low profile tire and rims and dual exhaust. The vehicle also has a 12-cylinder, 6-liter twin turbo charged Bentley engine. The vehicle has a concealed aerofoil with automatic deployment. It has an integrated infotainment system with 4-zone climate control, satellite navigation, and 12 speaker audio with DSP. It also has a hands free telephone system that is Nokia compatible and a six CD changer. The odometer reads 12,039 miles.

The minimum bid for the Bentley Coupe starts at \$66,200. The U.S. Marshals require that bidders submit a pre-bid deposit of \$13,240 prior to placing a bid. The pre-bid deposit submission is simple and can be completed on the auction listing page on the Bid4Assets Web site.
